

## Memorial Lecture

The 4th John Hepworth Memorial Lecture was held on Saturday, November 28 in the Council Chamber of Daneshill House. Carole Smithies BA OBE spoke of her lifetime passion for high places. Carole lives near Leeds and was the first woman member of the Manchester-based Rucksack Club to which John Hepworth belonged for over seventy years.

Her talk included many facts about mountains, the history of epic climbs, early explorers and attitudes to them as well as personal tales of daring in Britain and abroad. She did focus on the Munros. These are mountains in Scotland which are over 3000 feet in height (now, ridiculously, 914.4

metres.) She was the 21st female to 'bag' them and ranks Number 192 in the famous Munro Tables. We heard of the fear and discomfort involved in walking,

The lecture was accompanied by many stunning, and some rare, photographs, projected ably by Jim Callaghan.

### **NHDC** Consultation

Regular readers will be aware that both North Herts District Council and Stevenage Borough Council issued Local Plans for housing development to meet government requirements earlier this year and these plans were put out for public consultation. FOFC responded in January to NHDC and in July to SBC. Outlines of our arguments were covered in the Newsletters for April and August 2015.

NHDC received a huge response to its public consultation which showed the officials to be out of sympathy with the vast majority of the respondents. The proposals for

development were overwhelmingly opposed and will therefore be delayed.

The more valiant members of our committee are wading their way through the 8500 responses online. We did register our own objections but it is always worthwhile noting other people's arguments and hoarding them away for possible future use.

Plans for building in North Herts and Stevenage are interdependent and Forster Country is situated in both areas. It is unlikely that one authority can build on it unless both do. SBC has yet to publish the results of its consultation.

The question of what constitutes 'exceptional circumstances' for building on Green Belt land has to be decided in court. There is a 35 page government document on this subject but, as an alternative, a new Garden City, as recommended by several local MPs, is being considered.

This would, of course, necessitate loss of a huge area of countryside somewhere in the region and reminds us of the dilemma stated by Forster: People must have houses but something irreplaceable will be destroyed.

## Peterkin Award

The Peterkin Award for a Rural Living Champion is presented annually to an adult who has made an outstanding contribution to rural living in Hertfordshire. This year there were six nominations.

We are very pleased to announce that Margaret Ashby (co-founder of FOFC and currently a patron) was given this award at the 2015 CPRE Rural Living Awards Evening at County Hall, Hertford, on 20th October.

Margaret was recognised for "her

determination and dedication in ensuring the protection of a precious area of Green Belt known as Forster Country" for over thirty years.

The judges' citation went on to say that "it is very unlikely that, without Margaret's energy and enthusiasm, this piece of countryside would still be undeveloped."

However, as we all know, despite Margaret's efforts it remains vulnerable.

Nonetheless, well done, Margaret!
